The Forum is where students propose their plans for studying one of these issues abroad and also where they develop solutions for those issues when they come back to Japan.


Japan Maritime Self-Defense Force (Self-Defense Official) 2009 graduate, Department of Intercultural Studies, Faculty of Intercultural Studies

Language Study Program

Step-by-step Curriculum


Students choose from English, Chinese, Korean, or Spanish. They acquire basic proficiency in their first year and practical proficiency in their second year. YPU offers courses for a variety of ability levels and also courses which emphasize different language skills (speaking, listening, reading, writing). By taking courses right through to graduation, students can increase their proficiency stepby-step.

Overseas Study Program

In addition to widening knowledge at a global level, overseas internships and study abroad ultimately enable students to discover new perspectives on local problems and to acquire the ability to come up with concrete solutions to those problems from a global perspective. Students can choose from eight partner institutions in six countries and a variety of overseas study programs that differ according to length of stay and the goals of the student.



Language proficiency standards at graduation

Goals for language proficiency at graduation depend on a student's department and course. Courses are chosen during the second year of study, and students work towards a standard for language proficiency while studying their major. Whichever course is chosen, a higher level of language proficiency attainment is expected of those students who study abroad.

Learning with the local community

In order for students to become Inter-local Human Resources they need to understand regional and local problems and how to propose solutions to those problems. Students are encouraged to become a part of the local community and to utilize the strengths of Yamaguchi as a region in their studies. Furthermore, students learn to take a global perspective and make a real contribution to the local community by taking part in practical activities in the region.



Inter-local Studies < a venue for study >

Inter-local Studies I

This course provides an orientation to the program and active learning. Students acquire skills that help them settle smoothly into university life (studying, daily life, and personal relationships), so they will find fulfilment in their student career at YPU. Students learn to create a cycle of learning, reflection, and self-study.

Inter-local Studies II

Students in the Department of Intercultural Studies conduct fieldwork in the community to begin consideration of local issues. They develop observational and mental skills for identifying issues and finding solutions to problems. Fieldwork done domestically and abroad provides students with opportunities to learn how to communicate with people and gather information from them. Students in the Department of Culture and Creative Arts focus on arts, lifestyles, and culture in the region. They develop a practical understanding of these fields as well as the methodologies necessary for understanding them. Through this process, they become motivated to identify problems for themselves. In particular, students deepen their understanding of literature and the performing arts, as well as gaining an understanding of products and articles through hands-on design activities. Students work in groups to consider the directions society might take in the future.

Inter-local Studies III


Activities in the Active Learning Studio (Y-ACT) consist of three steps: (1) Students are given a topic \rightarrow (2) Students work in groups on the topic \rightarrow (3) Presentations are made and feedback is given. Over the course of five cycles, students come to a deeper understanding of local issues, choose one of these issues to do research during overseas study, and consider how they can contribute to the local community after they return from overseas study. At the end of the course, students present their study abroad fieldwork plans at the YPU Future Forum.

Inter-local Studies IV

During their time overseas, students deepen their understanding the fieldwork topic they choose before leaving Japan. Students understanding of the fieldwork use the YPU Future the Forum to present what they have learned to businesses and local community. This is the culmination of the Inter-local Studies program. The presentation helps establish a connection between study abroad and the student's future career while at the same time feeding the results of the fieldwork back into to the local community.

YPU Future Consortium < a venue for practical experience >

Making use of local and national businesses, government, NPOs and NGOs, and our partner institutions overseas, YPU has created a network where students can put into practice what they learn. Through this experience, and together with a deeper study of things learned in the Inter-local Studies program, students make a real contribution to the region and develop a "regional outlook" as members of the local community.

YPU Future Forum < a venue for presenting ideas >

Students and members of the YPU Future Consortium participate in the YPU Future Forum, which is held several times each year. The Forum is a venue for making presentations related to studies in the Inter-local Studies program as well as presenting the results of the activities of the YPU Future Consortium. The Future Forum is also a venue for discussion. The experience of presenting ideas to the Forum gives students an opportunity to organize what they have learned, listen to the opinions and guidance of others, deepen their own learning, and broaden their horizons. In addition to the presentations and discussions mentioned above, the Forum also holds talks, symposia, and other events on a wide variety of subjects.



Features of the project

Y-ACT Active Learning Studio

Y-ACT is a classroom designed for active and collaborative learning. It is a place where problem solving and presentation skills are honed and face to face as well as virtual meetings are held to prepare for fieldwork, It is also a venue for foreign language lectures given by overseas professors and guests and free seminars. Students can arrange the layout to suit themselves and the tasks they undertake.



LaLabo Active Learning Language Lab

LaLabo is a classroom with 30 computers equipped with a computer assisted language learning system, in addition to being available for use with English, Chinese and Korean classes, the classroom can also used by students for self-directed language learning.



Our goal is to send at least 80% of the students in the Faculty of Intercultural Studies overseas during their time at YPU. By combining overseas activities with local studies, we aim to develop Inter-local Human Resources who can make connections between communities in Japan and communities world-wide to solve the problems that both face. Inter-local Human Resources recognize the natural, historical, and cultural value and potential of individual communities and have the ability to be ambassadors for Yamaguchi and other Japanese communities in the wider world.

Five key points of YPU's program

- Four Skills $+\alpha$ and LaLabo : A language learning program and learning environment that develop high level language and intercultural communication skills
- Inter-local Studies and Y-ACT: A curriculum and learning environment that resemble "real-life" work environments and connect classroom studies to overseas experiences
- 3 YPU Future Consortium : A network that connects the classroom to community engagement and future employment
- 4 ACCrOSS Skills: Cross border potential which brings Japan and the world closer
- 5 PD Points : A system for saving points toward study abroad, scholarships, and Inter-local Human Resource status

ACCrOSS

ACCrOSS is an acronym for the six groups of skills and attitudes needed by Inter-local Human Resources. ACCrOSS skills can be used to transcend borders of nationality, culture, and age. Students decide which courses they should take and which activities they should undertake in order to develop these skills. Students use an e-portfolio to help set goals for themselves, measure their own progress, and then decide on their next objective.
